

From Pastor David

As we approach Holy Week once again, as we reflect on the suffering, death, and resurrection of Jesus, it is time to ask again, "What does the death of Jesus mean?"

It sounds like such a simple question. Yet, when we turn to Scripture we are offered several different answers.

In Hebrews 5, we are told that Jesus acts as both our great high priest and as a perfect sacrifice for our sins. In other words, God needs a sacrifice to forgive sins, and Jesus is that sacrifice. That made sense for the Jews of 2000 years ago who operated under a temple system, but does it work now? Some would claim that this is the only way to understand the death of Jesus, calling it "substitutionary atonement."

So, is Jesus' death a sacrifice for sin?

In John 12:24, Jesus describes his death as a grain of wheat dying so that it might produce much fruit.

So, is Jesus' death a sacrifice or a seed dying in the earth?

Later, in that same chapter, Jesus describes his death as being "lifted up from the earth" (John 12:32), alluding here – as he did in John 3:14-15 – to the story of the bronze snake lifted up in Numbers 21, saying that those who look at this sign might be drawn into the life of God.

So, is Jesus' death a sacrifice or a seed dying or a sign of healing lifted up?

Paul in Romans 6 says that the death and resurrection of Jesus like our baptism signifies a dying to an old way of life and being raised into a new way of life.

So, is Jesus' death a sacrifice or a seed dying or a sign of healing or a dying to an old way of life?

Then, in 1 Corinthians 15:20-28 Paul says that the death and resurrection of Jesus signifies that the final enemy – Death – has been defeated, because Jesus conquered death.

So, is Jesus' death a sacrifice or a seed dying or a sign of healing or a dying to an old way of life or a victory over death?

And perhaps quoting an early Christian hymn, Paul also says in Philippians 2 that the death of Jesus shows the ultimate humility and obedience of Jesus, "he humbled himself and became obedient to the point of death – even death on a cross." (Philippians 2:8)

So, is Jesus' death a sacrifice or a seed dying or a sign of healing or a dying to an old way of life or a victory over death or a sign of ultimate humility and obedience?

What does the death of Jesus mean? The answer is not so simple. These are all Scriptural answers that do not necessarily mesh with each other. Yet, the reality of Jesus' death and resurrection is central to us who follow in the way of Jesus. And this reality cannot be nailed down to simple doctrinal statements.

Rather, the death and resurrection of Jesus are a mystery that we embrace. They are a sign that Jesus has gone through all that we have gone through. They are a sign that we no longer have to live in our destructive ways. They are a sign that we can live a new way of life in the God who empowers and enlivens us.

So, as Holy Week approaches, let us walk with Jesus in the way of the cross, in the way of his death, and through that death may we find the love and life that God has promised for us all.

Pastor David leads a discussion on the upcoming Sunday's lessons.






