This month I want to share some words on the resurrection of a pastor friend of mine Garrett Andrew, who perhaps summons the meaning of this season best:

↑ Something Happened None of the stories agree. Not really.

Except for this: the stone was rolled away, and he was no longer there. The women saw angels—or they didn't. And were there two women, three women, even more women, or just Mary Magdalene? They all agree on

her at least.

There was one angel, or two. Or a young man in dazzling clothes. Or maybe it was someone who looked like he belonged there—someone with dirt under his nails, someone who might know where they moved the body.

Jesus was mistaken for a stranger, mistaken for a ghost, mistaken for a gardener because who expects resurrection to wear the face of the ordinary?

He appeared in locked rooms.

He walked through walls. He made breakfast on the beach. He vanished mid-blessing.

He offered peace like bread, breath like Spirit, wounds like windows.

Sometimes they touched him.

Sometimes they couldn't. Sometimes he called their name. Sometimes he just walked beside them and listened.

No one wrote it down the same. And maybe that's the most beautiful part.

Because something happened. Something broke the silence. Something tore the veil, split the stone, startled the soldiers, and scattered the fearful. Something happened that made them run, and weep, and wonder.

And none of them were the same again.

"I have seen the Lord!"—cried the woman who stayed behind, who mistook him for the gardener until he said her name.

"Were not our hearts burning within us...?"—whispered the travelers who didn't recognize him until the bread was broken.

"Yes Lord, you know that I love you."—answered the man who denied him, who dove into the sea at the sheer possibility of grace.

"My Lord and my God."-said the doubter, the realist, the brave one who dared to touch the wound.

They didn't all believe in the same way.

But they all were changed.


That's the miracle. Not agreement. Not certainty. Not perfect doctrine, polished and airtight. But the absurdity of joy after despair. The presence of love in a locked room. The echo of your name spoken by the one you thought was gone. Maybe that's why we still gather. Not because we've figured it out. But because something happened—something too real to ignore, too beautiful to explain. And we are still learning how to live like it's true, still wondering what it might mean, still listening for our own names in the hush between questions. Resurrection doesn't demand we get the story straight. It invites us into the garden. Into the upper room. Onto the road. To the shoreline of the ordinary where fish sizzle and grace still flickers on the fire. Something happened. And maybe it still isstill humming in the hush, still waking us like sunlight on closed eyes, still breaking into locked places with a peace we didn't ask for, still rising in the ordinary edges of our days like dew that wasn't there the night before. And we we still wonder if the gardener might be Christ, or if Christ might be the gardener. tending what we thought was lost until we hear our name-

like Mary heard hers and the soil stirs with resurrection.
